Become familiar with UK map and recognise UK countries (Yr1) and their capitals (Yr2).</p> <p>Continents & Oceans / Maps: Builds on previous term by expanding out from UK & Europe continent to wider world. Become familiar with world map. Feeds into Maps of the World (Year 2) & Describing Maps of the World (Year 3) units. Familiarisation of maps and identifying previously studied locations.</p> <p>Australia: Focus on a particular world country to explore in more detail as an example of a country in a different continent. Climate & weather: Comparing climate in previously studied locations and how climates vary based on map location (links to previous term)</p>
