Continuous Provision:	<p>Understand Chronology: Place events and artefacts in order on a timeline; Label timelines with words or phrases such as: past, present, older and newer; Use dates where appropriate. (Timeline will act like a working wall throughout the year.)</p> <p>Birthday wall: Display students' birthday months and dates on a timeline. This will encourage students to consider the passing of time.</p> <p>Today in History: Display throughout the year key events that happened on this day in history.</p>								
Deliberate choices:	<p>Local History Study (& Gunpowder plot): Start with key figure known to children and who lives in local area – Windsor Castle. Gunpowder plot included here to link with 5th November.</p> <p>Christopher Columbus: 1400s key figure. Precedes Term 3 topic chronologically.</p> <p>Neil Armstrong & The Moon Landing: 1900s Key figure and linked with key event of Moon landing. Make explorer comparisons with CC in previous topic Term 2 & 3 are chronological.</p> <p>The plague & Great Fire of London: 1600s events. Local area (London) Link with Gunpowder plot period from Y1.</p> <p>Florence Nightingale & Marie Curie: 1800s and 1900s key figures. After illness and death of previous topic, these figures represent care and advancement in treatment for sick.</p> <p>Inventions: Inventions from time periods already studied and then bring us up to date. Terms 1,2& 3 are chronological.</p>
