A flexible tailored approach

Keeping regular learning going during the period that schools are closed or a child cannot attend school is of great importance to reduce the impact on children's education.

Remote Educational Provision For Whole Classes

In the event that the school needs to close (this could be a class or key stage), class teachers will post weekly timetables on Class Dojo referencing our learning on our key stage website pages for their class. This will outline a range of learning activities in the full range of subject areas and contain tasks and links to follow (in any order and at a time that suits across the week). We appreciate that some families won't be able to engage with the full timetable, and in this case suggest they focus on key learning priorities to try to reduce the impact on children's core maths and English skills. Opportunities to join in with time-scheduled LIVE events, for example Read Write Inc Phonics Live Lessons, Times Tables Rockstars Class Competitions, EdShed, BBC Bitesize, etc. Throughout the day, further posts on Class Dojo will add extra detail or examples as necessary and Class Dojo assignments will be set to 'collect in' a piece of work. Staff will approve portfolio posts as soon as possible and give regular feedback on a child's portfolio. Other optional events and enrichment activity ideas will be spread throughout the week to help keep the children engaged and enthusiastic, as well as supporting their social interaction and physical and emotional wellbeing at this time.

Interaction

We are keen to make remote learning an interactive experience through the submission and sharing of work by children and delivery of feedback from teachers and arranging opportunities for pupils and families to compete, interact and collaborate, for example through Times Tables Rockstars competitions, EdShed. We will also provide some pre-recorded voice overs, to maintain a sense for them of being part of a class and remain in contact with the class teacher. First schools in Windsor have opted out of live sessions due to the age of the children, instead we offer the above and encourage a creative day with physical activity and movement breaks throughout the learning.
